

GUEST CHOREOGRAPHERS Richard House



Richard began his full-time training in Victoria, Australia at the Victorian College of the Arts in 2003, in his time at VCASS he was awarded the scholarship to study at the Dance School of Scotland in 2006. After his time at VCASS he was accepted into The Australian Ballet School where he graduated in 2008. Whilst there, Richard continued his passion for choreography and was awarded the Graeme Murphy Award for Excellence in

Contemporary Dance. Richard toured with Australian Ballet's regional company during his graduating year and joined The Australian Ballet in 2011. Over his eight years with the company, Richard choreographed six works, being performed at the Sydney Opera House, State Theatre Melbourne, and many other theatres around Australia. In addition to creations for the stage, Richard has choreographed for film. His credits include The Australian Ballet's 2017 season campaign, the music video for Australian artist Fiction Writer from The Preatures single No Rumour, and a duet for Australian Broadcasting Company's (ABC) classical music campaign which received over 70,000 views when launched in 2018. Integral to his development as a choreographer, Richard benefitted from the Khitercs scholarship whilst at The Australian Ballet which facilitated a range of shadowing and observational opportunities with choreographers including Akram Khan, Wayne McGregor and companies like The Royal Ballet, Bolshoi Ballet, and National Ballet of Canada. Richard joined the Sarasota Ballet as a Soloist for the 2018/2019 season, choreographing Sketch Tones for the Sarasota Ballet's Studio Company, and Tomorrow's Dust for a collaboration between Sarasota Ballet's Studio Company, the trainees of the Margaret Barbieri Conservatory and Key Chorale Choir in 2021. Richard has continued close ties with arts organisations in Australia, having choreographed ballets for Victorian College of The Arts Secondary School and The Australian Ballet School in 2019. For the Sarasota Ballet's 2022/2023 season he created Living Ghosts for the company whilst still performing at the rank of Junior Principal. He is now excited to be moving to Semperoper Ballet in Dresden, Germany, where he will be joining the company in August 2023.

Paul Knobloch



Paul Knobloch is noted by critics for having a unique movement vocabulary based on the highly developed fusion of classical and contemporary dance. He has performed all over the world with The Australian Ballet, West Australian Ballet, English National Ballet, Béjart Ballet Lausanne, Alonzo King LINES Ballet and Sydney Dance Company.

His choreographic style is characterised by its fluidity, athleticism, and emotional depth. He seamlessly combines classical ballet techniques with a contemporary movement vocabulary, creating a dynamic and visually stunning experience for performers and audiences alike. His works often explore themes of human relationships, identity, and the human condition, inviting viewers to connect with the stories he tells through movement.

Throughout his career, he has collaborated with renowned choreographers and artists, both in Australia and internationally. His collaborations have resulted in the creation of numerous original works that have been performed on prestigious stages around the world

In addition to his choreographic work, Paul Knobloch is also a highly sought-after teacher and coach. He has conducted masterclasses and workshops for professional dancers, aspiring students, and dance institutions worldwide with guesting positions for Les Ballet de Monte Carlo, Tokyo Ballet, Hong Kong Ballet, St Petersburg Ballet Theatre, National Ballet of China and many leading schools and institutions across Australia, Europe and the USA. His teaching style combines technical precision with artistic expression, emphasising the importance of musicality, storytelling, and individual interpretation in dance.

Paul's contributions to the dance world have been recognized with various awards and honours. He has received critical acclaim for his performances, choreography, and teaching, solidifying his status as a prominent figure in the dance community.

Overall, Paul Knobloch's unique movement vocabulary, combined with his talent as a dancer, choreographer, and teacher, has made a significant impact on the world of dance. His innovative approach to blending classical and contemporary dance styles continues to inspire and captivate, and he endeavours to continue making and sharing his love of dance for many generations to come.

Joseph (Joe) Newton-Keogh is a Naarm-based, multi-disciplinary artist, working independently as a contemporary dancer/choreographer, sculptor, filmmaker, and installation artist.

Following his training at the Victorian College of the Arts Secondary School and New Zealand School of Dance, Joe has directed large scale art installations, performed in and choreographed multiple independent dance projects, directed and produced music videos, and presented sculpture exhibitions.

As a practitioner and teacher of soft acrobatics, Joe is becoming increasingly intrigued by peak physical performance and mastery. With a deep love for absurdity, Joe aims to allow surrealism to bleed through the cracks of realism within his creative work. It is his choreographic mission to merge these interests.
